We don't even need to talk about God to begin this process, just get to know someone. Find some:

- ★common interests
- ★hobbies
- \star life experiences.

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Then let the Holy Spirit guide you in your walk/talk.

The getting to know the person portion can be with:

- ♥ friends or relatives that you already have
- ♥ people you've recently met or
- even with yourself (this one could be the most instructive, to evaluate what you think you know about yourself and renew your commitments)

As the fire is started we need to tend it to make sure it doesn't get extinguished. This can be done with:

- ✓ prayer
- ✓ Bible study
- ✓ a phone call
- ✓ a snail mail note
- \checkmark getting together for coffee
- \checkmark book discussions
- ✓ gardening
- \checkmark taking a walk
- ✓ or whatever else that brings the people together.

Through all of this we need to keep praying for assistance and guidance.

Some of you are great igniters, but for a lot of us this process can be daunting. If you are one that has difficulty in this, then seek assistance from others.

God has given each of us gifts to be used to help spread the Good News of our redemption.

As a thank you for these gifts we joyfully undertake what God has placed before us,

and take a leap of faith to become

IGNITERS!!!

As we begin this new biennium, I am reminded of that great old hymn: "WITH THE LORD BEGIN YOUR TASK". That is great advice as we look and plan for the next 4 years. Certainly, the head of the church, our Lord Jesus Christ, already knows what He has in mind for our ministry together in the days ahead. So, let us pray and seek His guidance so that our plans and His coincide. I would urge you to do so DAILY. Daily "CHECKING IN" with the Lord, not only asking that He give wis-

I am not sure who to give credit to for it, because I do not remember who shared it or where I saw it. But whoever it was that brought it to my attention, I want to thank them, because it has been a blessing to many and is a good reminder of the importance of checking in with the Lord on a regular basis. The story is entitled - "Just Checking In".

"A pastor passed through his church one day and noticed someone at the altar praying. The pastor first noticed that the individual hadn't shaved in quite some time. Then he saw that his shirt was kinda shabby and his coat was torn and frayed. The man was kneeling with his head bowed. Then he rose and left the church. Each day that followed, this individual would enter the church, kneel and pray, sit outside on the steps, open his lunch pail and eat his lunch. After some time, the pastor became curious and just a little uneasy, because the homeless population was growing in that area and he wondered about the man's intentions. So, one day the pastor stopped the visitor and asked, "can I help you?" The man said that he worked in the factory a short distance away and only had a half hour for lunch and lunchtime was he prayer time, for finding strength and power. (And he found the church a great place to pray)

"I stay only a few moments," he said, "because you see the factory I work at is a ways down the street. But as I kneel here talking with the Lord, this is kinda what I say: 'I just came again to tell you, Lord, how happy I have been since we found each other's friendship and You took away my sin. Don't know much how to pray, but I think about you every day. So, Jesus, this is Jim... and I'm just checking in."

The pastor, feeling a bit foolish, told Jim,that that was fine and he was welcome to come and pray anytime. "Thanks," Jim said, with a smile. "Time to go," and he hurried to the door.

The pastor knelt at the altar. (It had been sometime since he had done that outside of worship). His suspicious thoughts melted away, warmed with love, he met Jesus there. As tears flowed, in his heart, he repeated old Jim's prayer: "I just came again to tell you, Lord, how happy I have been since we found each other's friendship and You took away my sin. I think about You every day. So, Jesus, this is me... and I am just checking in."

Well, one day Jim did not show up to pray. More days passed and no Jim. The pastor became concerned and decided to go to the factory and inquire about him. He discovered that Jim had become ill and been hospitalized.

The hospital staff was worried about Jim, but he had given them a thrill. The week that Jim was with them brought changes to the ward. His smiles and his joy were contagious and brought the best out of his care givers. The head nurse couldn't understand why Jim was so joyful. He received no flowers nor cards. No family nor friends had come to visit or show interest in him.

When the pastor heard of his situation, he decided to visit. As he sat at Jim's bedside, he shared the nurses concern; No friends came to show they cared. He had nowhere to turn... Looking surprised, old Jim spoke up and with a winsome smile, he said, "The nurse is wrong, she couldn't know, that He's in here all the



while. Every day at noon He is here, a dear Friend of mine, you see. He sits right down, takes my hand, leans over and says to me: 'I came again to tell you Jim, how happy I have been since we found this friendship, and I took away your sin. Always love to hear you pray, and I think about you every day. Jim, this is Jesus, and I am just checking in."

What a Friend we have in Jesus. I pray that this story is an encouragement to you and a motivation toward faithful and diligent daily prayer.

Seeking Balance

Are you balanced?

Did you know that your nervous system craves balance?

I have been taking an online chair yoga class, via Zoom, since March. Each week we practice various stretches and moves for an hour, most of which are done while sitting in a chair. However, there are several moves where we stand.

The standing moves are where we practice balance. When was

the last time you stood on one leg without holding onto anything? Let me tell you, my "tree pose" didn't start out very pretty, good thing there was a chair close by to grab onto to help me keep my balance. But after a few months, I can now do several "tree pose" moves without needing to hang onto something.

I never realized how important balance was until I took a stumble last November and fractured my pelvis in two places. My physical therapist kept giving me all kinds of exercises to strengthen my balancing abilities. Apparently my "core" was not in the best shape and I had a long way to go before I could balance myself on the exercise floor. I soon learned that if your "core" isn't in very good shape, then the rest of your body will struggle to find balance in all that you do.

And during my recovery time I also realized that balance is not just about being physically fit. There's another form of balance that we need to remain healthy: a balance of the mind and spirit.



Getting sidelined wasn't my plan, but apparently it was God's plan for me. I spent 13 weeks doing physical therapy twice each week. Home exercises also became part of my daily routine. And then there was my "planner." You know, that calendar that has something on it every day of the week, like Bible Study, church, volunteering, meetings to attend, social gatherings, etc. I had all my days filled with "something" to do.

God's plan changed all that. He sidelined me and told me

"you're not balanced in the right places."

Not balanced physically, but more importantly, I wasn't balanced spiritually. I had sidelined God. There was no room for Him on my calendar. I was physically hurt and emotionally depleted.

So, I practiced balance. I cleared out my calendar of all events. I went to physical therapy and I started to read the Word. I started a gratitude journal and spent time in prayer. I rearranged my priority

list and started to put God first.

And by the time we were all put into quarantine, I was pretty balanced. I felt physically better, but more importantly I felt spiritually healed. My core felt balanced at a different level.

Sometimes God has a plan that we don't understand. We have all been in lock down for months now. We have all missed events, weddings, funerals, traveling, vacations, family members, etc. We have all watched as our Nation and our cities have been compromised by protestors. We have watched as hatred once again surfaced in our dayto-day world.

So, how's your balance?

With no religious life personnel, it means that devotions that were being delivered virtually, will no longer be occurring, so the people living with intellectual and developmental disabilities that Bethesda supports will no longer have an opportunity to hear God's Word and have someone to hear and pray for their prayer requests.

A prayer request for you LWML prayer warriors is to pray that Bethesda's decision makers truly seek the Lord and His ways and will in all of their decisions, that they will be given a way to provide Christcentered care to all the people they support, and that their financial situation would improve. Please thank the Lord for the faith He has given most of the people Bethesda supports, and for Christian staff members to truly share the love of Jesus with those they are supporting.

An opportunity to be a telephone friend with one of the people Bethesda supports is being worked out. Individual Christians would be able to have the first name of a person, whom they could then call on the phone (hopefully virtually so faces could be enjoyed), and share a devotion, sing "Jesus Loves Me" with, and pray with. The person would also be able to call you and ask for specific prayers or share joys. As soon as the logistics on this are worked out, the details will be made available.

In the meantime, ways to get a couple of tablets into each home for use by the clients to worship virtually, see and hear family and friends, and receive devotions, are being pursued. Could this be a project for your LWML society, or a Thrivent Action Team grant project for your congregation? Please contact me if you are interested in either or both of these opportunities.

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Working Together for the Good of Others

As Lutheran Women in Mission, we adapt to ways we can safely support those in our community. We look for new ways to serve one another while social distancing. We continue to recognize the needs of others as we plan for a new school year.

Ideas for Activities

Drive-thru Food Pantry or School Supply Collection Dav

- \Rightarrow Talk to your local food pantry, a neighborhood school, or a day care facility in your community. Get a list of their most needed items during this time and discuss distribution options.
- Decide who will be offered the service based on your group size. De- \Rightarrow velop a way to contact those people.
- Advertise the "Needs List" to your church/community. Consider social media to help spread the word. It might be helpful to mention that precautions are being taken when the items are packed (the packers will use hand sanitizer and wear masks), and that masks will be worn during pickup and delivery.
- Select a date, place, and time for dropping off items. Keep the drop-off \Rightarrow time short and/or break up the drop-off times. Consider two hours in the early morning and two hours in the evening, or two days for drop-off if your group is large.
- \Rightarrow Solicit a small group of volunteers for drop-off. The volunteers will accept the donation items from each vehicle when they drive up and take them to the holding area.
- \Rightarrow Set up a small group to assemble the items into bags to make pick-up or delivery quick and easy.
- \Rightarrow Establish a pick-up method. Take items to the food pantry or school for them to distribute, or set a pick-up time at a church or other location.
- \Rightarrow Consider having another set of volunteers to deliver the items, if the project recipient cannot come to pick up the donated items.
- \Rightarrow Contact the sewing ladies in your church/community. Ask them to provide masks, especially children's sizes. Pack each mask in a zip-lock bag. Have them available for the volunteers to pass out to anyone in need of a mask, or give them to the school or daycare facility.

Gospel Focus

Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble mind (1 Peter 3:8).

Prayer as you Plan and Prepare

Heavenly Father, thank You for allowing us the privilege of creatively serving others in Your name during this time of pandemic. You have directed us to realize that there are still plenty of ways to be Your hands and feet and to think outside of our normal avenues.
